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#### **EDITORIAL**

The basic problem with man's increasing technological advance, is his dependence on fellow man.

Nearly all processes involving mechanisation can be controlled electrically, electronically or mechanically and the trend is to automate as much as possible. In the majority of applications encountered every day, automation is an economic advantage for the concern involved. Safety, however, also plays a large part in attempting to automate as much as possible. The vital problem with automation is creating safer control of machinery is: how much faith can be placed in the control equipment? Because no matter how good the control equipment is in theory or design, somewhere along the line, human error must enter the situation. So the problem of how much control to give to the operator and how much to leave to automated control arises.

The fear in the minds of a great many people is that automation and control will take over completely. It would be the only perfect conclusion, but then who wants a world full of computers and no room for us?

# Brew it yourself

With all the hot weather still to come, now is the time to supplement your stock of wine with something longer and more refreshing.

I have just polished off the last of a gallon of lager made according to the following recipe, and found that it was very simple to make, and as good as the commercial lagers.

#### LAGER

#### INGREDIENTS

l lb Light dried malt extract

 $\frac{1}{2}$  oz Hops (preferably Danish lager hops known as Hallertaner, but Boot s own is a good second best).

1 Saltspoon Litric acid.

Yeast (preferably lager yeast)

#### METHOD

Bring half a gallon of water to the boil, add the malt, hops and citric acid, and simmer for 45 minutes. Strain the liquid into a bucket, make up to 1 gallon with cold water, add the yeast and cover closely.

Fermentation should have finished with in 7 days and the beer should be siphoned off the lees into clean beer bottles (don't worry if it is still slightly cloudy).

Prime the beer by adding one  $\underline{\text{Level}}$  teaspoon of sugar to each pint and seal the bottles with plastic  $\overline{\text{caps}}$  (obtainable from Boots) store upright for two weeks before drinking.

The first lesson you must learn is not to miss a meal at all. Always have a breakfast, lunch and dinner, but another lesson to remember is not to pick between meals, and if you are really desperate for something to chew, try a stick of celery.

The dangerous foods which contain most calories, are of course, sweets, cakes, biscuits, bread and potatoes.

Here is a menu for a day and if you can keep to this, you are bound to lose a few £££s.

#### Breakfast

- 4 oz orange or grapefruit juice, or half grapefruit or other high Vitamin C fruit (to be counted as one fruit)
- \* 1 egg or 1 oz hard cheese or 2 oz fish or 2 oz cottage cheese

- \* 4 oz fish (tinned or fresh) or lean meat or poultry or 4 oz cottage cheese or 2 oz hard cheese or 2 eggs


