

The opening Film Show of the Season was attended by more than sixty people. Their reaction to the film can be seen below. The introduction of dual projection seems to have been well received by the audience. Although there were some teething troubles, these will be sorted out before the next show.

As usual, the Soiree that followed was enjoyed by everybody, especially by Geoff Holder who also won the raffle!!

The Secretary of the British Federation of Film Societies was present at the opening Film Show, (it was she who drew Geoff Holder's winning ticket from the hat) and wrote this account of the evening which is reproduced as it appeared in the Federation Newsletter for October:-

BICC FILM SOCIETY - 19TH SEASON SOIREE

BICC opened their new season on a social note. A screening of FAR FROM THE MADDING CROWD was followed by a soiree with free refreshments and a raffle of a season ticket. The highlight of the proceedings was the trial screening with 2 projectors and the changeovers were generally smooth. I was pleased to notice that despite having only one hour in which to prepare the hall, the committee had mounted a display of forthcoming programmes, posters, film information, including NFT programmes. Brochures and copies of FILM were freely available and each member was given a reaction sheet. Individual programme booklets on each film are prepared and forthcoming titles include DEEP END, DON'T DELIVER US FROM EVIL and THE BLACK PIRATE (1926) THE BANK DICK.

Our next show is on October 25th and is liberally illustrated in this issue of the Bush Telegraph. The main film is Deep End starring Jane Asher, made in 1970, it was one of the films chosen for the London Film Festival last year. Supporting DEEP END will be LES BICYCLETTES DE BELSIZE and THE BLACK PIRATE. The latter film is a shortened sound version of the 1926 swashbuckling classic starring Douglas Fairbanks Snr. It was chosen following the popularity last season of ORPHANS OF THE STORM.

Our Christmas show is on December 6th and will feature Zeffirelli's ROMEO AND JULIET which was chosen for the 1968 Royal Film Performance. It will be supported by APPARANCES a charming French film about 18th Century mechanical dolls.

All members' children, brothers and sisters, between the ages of 4-12 are invited.





Horticultural Society

The first frost will turn dahlia blooms and foliage into a blackened mass. After cutting the plants down to about 4 in, the roots should be listed for storage of the dormant tuber over winter. After washing off all soil allow the tubers to dry thoroughly, clip off fine roots and store in trays of peat.

Another autumn task is to dig over the vegetable garden to a full spade's depth, turning over the clods but not breaking them up. This permits the frost to penetrate the ground and encourage winter weathering, ensuring a good seed tilth in the spring.

Roses, more than most plants, need putting to bed properly for the winter. The top growth of floribundas and hybrid teas should be reduced by about a third by light pruning to lessen wind rocking which can loosen roots.

All foliage that has been attacked by black-spot or rust should be removed and burned to prevent further infection. Dead wood should also be cut away.

SPRAY

One way of controlling disease is to give roses that are dormant and the bed around them a thorough spray with a solution made up of 1 oz of copper sulphate in one gallon of water.

The sprayer should afterwards be thoroughly washed out with warm water and washing soda for copper sulphate can harm the metal parts.

Standard roses should also be carefully examined to ensure that all the ties are secure for the winter and top growth should also be thinned to minimise wind disturbance.

Rambling roses and weeping standards should be pruned immediately after flowering. At the same time, old wood should be removed and new growth made secure. If this was overlooked, the job can be done now.

Climbing roses should be pruned early in the spring but new growth can be made secure in the autumn if the job has not been done.

FIRMED

Shrub roses, which require little attention, should have the surrounding earth firmed to prevent too much water being trapped around the neck. If the water freezes it can cause damage.

It is not wise to mulch roses in the autumn or early winter because this makes the roots too wet during the dormant season. The best time to mulch is after pruning in early spring.

The lawn also needs to be put to bed for the winter. It should be raked gently to remove creeping and dead grass and should be spiked with an aerator.

A dressing of granular peat and sand can then be worked in with the back of a rake.

"Gourmet's dish to give you the galloping"....

Our thanks go to anon. of Alperton, and Tom Ruben for spotting this gem in The Times of 14th September.

It's worth buying Albadoro Cannelloni if only for the cooking instructions as rendered into English on the packet. My quotation, complete to bring out the full flavour, follows with spelling and grammar untouched:

"Important: Albadoro Cannelloni do not ought to boil.

- " 1. Bring in Cannelloni, as they are, a stuffing maked with: beef, eggs, cheese, parmigiano, papper or spices, as you like, all well amalgamated ad juicy.
- " 2. Besmear a backing-pan, previously buttered, with a good tomato-sauce and after, dispose the Cannelloni, lightly distanced between them, in a only couch.
- "At last, for a safe success in cooking, shed the remnant sauce possibly diluted with broth, as far as to cover the surface of Cannelloni.
- " 3. Add puffs of butter and grated cheese, cover the backing-pan, and put her into the over, previously warmed at 180/200 centigrade degrees above zero.
- " 4. Cook for about half of hour at the same temperature without to uncover the backin-pan and after, to help at table."

Brew it yourself

Most wines are fermented and matured in anaerobic conditions i.e. air is excluded as much as possible from the wine by use of a fermentation trap and keeping the vessels topped up. Sherry on the other hand is a wine that "breaks the rules" in order to get its characteristic flavour.

During both fermentation and maturing of sherry, air is allowed free access to the wine by keeping the fermentation vessel only $\frac{7}{6}$ full and plugging the neck with cotton wool. This way the wine oxidises, darkens in colour, and attains a sherry flavour. Another important difference between conventional wine making and making sherry is that the sherry is allowed to mature upon the yeast and only racked off when bottling This type of maturation allows the yeast to redissolve in the wine (a process known as autolysis) and in the case of ordinary yeasts will cause off-flavours, but if a sherry yeast is used the flavour and bouquet of the sherry is enhanced.

Sultana Sherry

Ingredients

Sultanas	1 1b	Citric acid	l tsp
Grapes	1 1b	Water	7 pints
Barley	$\frac{1}{2}$ lb	Sherry, yeast and r	nutrient
Sugar	$2\frac{1}{2}$ lb		

Method

Soak the barley overnight in water then strain and mince both grain and sultanas. Place fruit, sugar, and grain in a 2 gallon bucket and pour over 7 pints of boiling water. When cool stir in yeast, nutrient and acid, cover closely and leave for 10 days, then strain into a fermentation jar and plug the neck with cotton wool.

If a sherry yeast has been used, do not rack the wine off the yeast for at least nine months and rack a second time into bottles when clear.

Do not add campden tablets to the wine until just prior to bottling as these will prevent oxidation of the sherry.
