Presentations

Dr. P.C. McNeill 9 years service (Presentation 24th May)

Dr. McNeill initially joined BICC as Chief Engineer Designate and later became a Board Member, Director of Balfour Beatty and BICC representative at ERA and IEE. He was also for several years Chairman of the Athletic and Social Club.

Mr. Banks in making the presentation of a cut glass bowl and claret glasses thanked him for this loyal service to the company.

In reply Dr. McNeill thanked all who had helped to make his work so interesting and had given him plenty of happy memories to take with him to his new appointment outside BICC.

Ron Dicker 32 years service (Presentation 26th May)

Ron on leaving the army as a corporal, in 1946 joined BICC as a mechanic and driver, a job he held up to his retirement.

Mr. Banks thanked Ron for the help he had given to many people on site and then presented him with a cheque for £87. A reward to somebody who had never taken a day's sick leave, been late or had an accident as a company driver.

Ron then surprised everybody by saying a four letter word - BICC - apparently the only one his wife thinks he knows.

Esme Morgan 7 years service (Presentation 30th May)

Esme joined BICC at Bloosmbury Street as Secretary to Dr. McNeill and subsequently transferred to Wood Lane. Prior to this she had led a very varied life both in terms of jobs and also travel abroad.

Dr. McNeill in making the presentation of a cheque praised Esme for her professional approach to her work, commented on her pungent sense of humour and wished her well in her new job as personal assistant to Sir Edward Lewis at the Decca Company.

In reply Esme stated that she had enjoyed most of her time at Wood Lane and took away memories of many good friends.

Ron Tarbox 41 years service (Presentation 30th May)

Mr. Banks made the presentation to Ron Tarbox who officially retires at the end of June.

At the end of the war he had returned to Cable Research and in 1948 became Assistant Patent Officer of the newly created British Insulated Callender's Cable Company. In 1967 he was promoted to Patents Officer and transferred from Bloomsbury Street to Wood Lane in 1970 as Commercial and Patents Officer (later manager) gaining a wide knowledge of the company by virtue of his bimonthly visits to the manufacturing Divisions.

He was presented with a radio, a comprehensive collection of artists materials and some money.

Dear Sirs,

The old back-room boffins of BREL can write limericks that rhyme fairly well but a little expansion of their knowledge of scansion might cause feelings of rhythm to swell.

- P.S. I try to keep to the following rules when writing limericks:
 - (1) There must be three and only three stressed syllables in each of the first, second and fifth lines and only two in each of the third and fourth lines.
 - (2) In the basic form, all of the feet, except the opening foot which is an iambus (" di dah"), are anapests ("diddy dah"). The number of unstressed syllables can be increased, with discretion, to vary the pace by replacing the anapest by "didelly dah" or even "didellydy dah" or decreased by replacing anapests at the beginning of other lines than the first by iambuses (di dah).
 - (3) The rhyme must always be on a naturally stressed syllable, e.g. channel must be "dah di" not "di dah" (unless it is intended to refer to a perfume!). An unstressed syllable can precede or follow the rhyming syllable but, if it follows, then though the rhyming syllables must differ, the identical unstressed syllable must be used in each case (i.e. objector rhymes with Hector, but not with protected or injector and unexpected rhymes with projected). The number of unstressed syllables preceding the stressed rhyming syllable is unimportant, and they can differ.

Other poets may have different licences, if so I would be interested to hear of them. If I have transgressed, then I am willing to suffer the usual suspension of my licence.

Social Club AGM

The 27th Annual General Meeting of the Wood Lane Athletic and Social Club was held in the Main Hall on Thursday 25th May in the presence of 19 members. In the absence of the Chairman (Dr. McNeill) the meeting was chaired by Mr. S.M. Castle (Vice-Chairman) who was supported by Mr. J. Heggie (Hon. Gen. Sec.) and Mr. P. Donovan (Hon. Treasurer).

Although the items on the Agenda did not suggest that the meeting would be anything but brief, in fact a full and lively discussion of various items occurred and, as a result the meeting lasted nearly 1½ hours (a new record?).

The meeting was opened by the formal presentation of the Minutes of the previous AGM which were duly approved. The Vice-Chairman then gave an excellent review of the sections' activities throughout the year, in which he highlighted several successful events that had occurred. He concluded by thanking both Dr. McNeill and Mr. Heggie (both of whom were relinquishing their posts) for their active support on behalf of the Club, and announced under rule 7, that Mr. J. Banks had agreed to be the new Club Chairman. Although a volunteer had come forward to fill the post of Hon. Gen. Sec., no formal announcement could be made until official approval had been received upon Mr. Banks' return from Australia.

The Hon. Treasurer then presented the audited accounts and stated that the Club was in a healthy financial state and that, although budgets for the various sections had been cut back there was no cause for alarm.

There were several questions from the floor on various aspects of the accounts including?

- (i) Sales turn-over figures for the bar (from Graham Taylor)
- (ii) Bush Telegraph and Television Rental (from Dr. Fox)
- (iii) Company grant as related to increased inflation over the past years (from Mike Hagger).
 - (The chair promised that the new Executive Council will look into this matter)
 - (iv) Insurance coverage against film damage (from Annette Mattock).

 This led to a fuller discussion on insurance aspects in general and a promise from the Hon. Treasurer for the whole subject to be reviewed with the Executive Council.
 - (v) Differentiation in cost to members and non members at functions (from Mike Hagger and Alan Bangay).

The Vice-Chairman then announced that the number of members who had submitted themselves for election to (i) the Executive Council and (ii) the Bar Committee had not exceed the total numbers required under the relevant rules and therefore voting was not required. The names submitted were read out and accepted from the floor. One other person had submitted his name for the Bar Committee too late to be included for election but it was suggested from the Chair that the new Bar Committee might wish to co-opt the said member.

Other items raised from the floor included:

- (i) What action was being taken to fill the vacant post of President of the Club (from Mike Hagger) and he was assured that this matter was being actively considered.
- (ii) Assurance was sought that the new Executive Council would meet regularly every three months as dictated by the Club rules (from Mike Hagger). Such an assurance was given from the Chair.
- (iii) A request that a current list of members be circulated to section Secretaries (made by Annette Mattock) was countered by a proposal from Mike Hagger that a list of non-members would be simpler!

The Chair agreed that the Executive Council could resolve the request to the satisfaction of all!!

(iv) Finally, Mike Hagger asked for consideration to be given to continuation of Club membership after a person had left the Company.

The meeting closed at 18.55 hours. The Bar opened at 18.56 hours.

CRICKET SECTION


