Editorial

By now nobody can be in any doubt that development of the site to the North of the Access Road has started, and we had promised to include in this issue a detailed description of the planned work, together with a number of diagrams, based on the information given at the recent 5th Floor meeting.

Unfortunately, despite constant pressure on Messrs Henry Boot by Fran Lam and Christine Haylock, the diagrams have not been received in the intervening 3½ weeks. The report in this issue is therefore based only on notes taken on 19th October, and a composite drawing from which information about the roadway has been abstracted.

The relationship between BICC and the White City Industrial Park development is scheduled to last for 2½-3 years whether we like it or not. During this period one group of people will be inconvenienced more than any other, and that group is ourselves. The developers have undertaken to do all they can to minimise the inconvenience. They promise to keep roads and pavements as clean as possible, to ensure that lighting is at all times adequate, to restrict noise to minimum levels and even to carry out certain work at weekends. They will also, it is said, be having regular meetings with REL Management. The function of the regular meetings (and it is also hoped that day-to-day contact will be established between John Littler's department and the site development office) will be to iron out the problems which will inevitably arise and, we hope, form part of a public relations exercise designed to keep you informed of progress. The absence of the promised diagrams, albeit a small matter, is nevertheless an inauspicious start to this promised liaison.

Local management will do all in its power to minimise the discomfort to staff during this upheaval, and we are sure that staff will not be slow in complaining if things get out of hand. Nevertheless we must remember that ultimately we will have a greatly improved access facility, and possibly even a pub to celebrate the fact.


Retirement Presentations

Alf's many friends and colleagues contributed to a fine carriage clock to mark their affection for him and a signed card, big enough to re-roof your average house. Mr. John Endacott made the presentation and as the photograph shows, Alf was left speechless - except to direct all and sundry to the Duke of Clarence where he would be 'at home'.

At a ceremony in the Studio on 26th October a presentation was made to Ann Denholm, who has retired after 5 years as Wood Lane's printer. Ann and her husband Vic, who retired earlier in the year (see Bush Telegraph, June 1979), are emigrating to New Zealand in December to join some of their family already there. One of Ann's last major jobs at Wood Lane was to help bring the new Rotaprint, recently installed in the Studio, into full operation, and our photograph shows Ann and Vic standing behind that machine.


Last Puff


Landmark of the 'never never',

White City Industrial Park

On the 19th October, the management invited all staff to attend a discussion meeting on the development of the site adjacent to our laboratories (to be known as the White City Industrial Park) at which representatives of the developers and the construction companies would be present. These gentlemen included



who not only gave details of their plans of operation but were prepared to answer any questions within their fields of activity. For the benefit of those who were unable to attend for various reasons and those who did attend but were unable to follow the proceedings due to the poor acoustics and crowded room we are attempting to set down the facts as we understand them at this moment (see Editorial). We assure you that we will add to this information as soon as we possibly can as we realise the forthcoming winter is going to be difficult for both motorists and pedestrians as they attempt to reach their place of work.

As we understand the overall plans as outlined at the meeting the development will be carried out in three phases:-

Phase I

The Wood Lane entrance to the private road will be substantially widened and a temporary road and footpath will be constructed to the north of the existing private road, thus enabling the latter road to be up graded during 1980. These operations are more easily understood if read in conjunction with an abstract of the official site drawing, shown below.



The final positioning of the temporary road is to be decided on site and will be governed by loading factors with respect to the Central line tunnel which crosses the site. We are assured that street lighting and freedom from mud will be given top priority at all stages to both footpath and roadway, especially as the temporary road will not come into operation until February 1980 during the height of the winter. Whilst this activity is underway, the contractors will also be sinking a shaft into Wood Lane on the South side of the entrance to the private road to ascertain the services beneath the road. This operation has, in fact, already commenced and is expected to last for 10 weeks.

Phases II and III

Upon completion a second, and larger shaft will be sunk into Wood Lane just North of the entrance to the private road. In fact, just by the railway bridge. This work will extend into the road (as witnessed by the recent activity towards White City Underground Station, associated with the Marks and Spencer development) and obviously traffic flow will be affected for the period of work - about 25 weeks. To add to the inconvenience, the lorries will continue to have access to the lorry park behind our site and it is understood by the developers that there are no plans to abolish this facility (nuisance).

Obviously overlapping of the phases will occur but the prime objectives in Phases II and III will be the (i) construction of high quality factories (ii) construction of high quality warehouses and (iii) construction of an office block, and possibly, a public house. The possible introduction of traffic lights at the junction of Wood Lane and the access road has not been overlooked, but is not part of the existing plans.

Completion of the operations is not anticipated for about 3 years i.e. towards the end of 1982 but a final benefit to BICC personnel will be the adopted status of the access road and its attendant compliance with the various highway and traffic acts e.g. parking restrictions.

Apart from the obvious inconveniences to BICC Staff, activity associated with the construction of the buildings will also be apparent, especially pile driving which will affect all office and laboratory buildings on the North Side of our site. The contractors have promised to minimise the effect of these activities and where possible carry out some of the work at week-ends. However it was stressed that with all the planning in the world, day-to-day problems will arise and it is hoped to "iron-out" these, by maintaining close co-operation between BICC Management and the Site Engineer. In addition, regular monthly meetings between the interested parties are planned.

As soon as we can, we will publish the site development drawings so that you will be fully informed as to what is proposed for the next 3 years. However, if you have any problems arising from this work, our management will be only too pleased to lend a sympathetic ear and help in any practical way it can. Your views to the BT will also be most welcome.
